

Some FatherLee thoughts:

"Anyone who is in Christ, is a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17)

New Years is an arbitrary day for us to mark time. It brings with it, however, the opportunity for people to get a fresh start. Many of us make "New Year's Resolutions", wanting to be a better version of ourselves.

I fully support anyone who seeks to become a better person, more of who they want to be. This year really got me thinking, especially about the words we use. Are you seeking to be more like the person you want to be? Or, is your desire to be more like the person God sees in you?

I know what some of you are thinking, "You phrased that weird, Fr. Scott. Don't you mean: Do you want to be the person God wants you to be?" Nope! I said it exactly how I see it: Are we striving to be who we want to be, or who God sees in us?

Look, the Almighty created you, formed you, and has known and loved you since before you were born. And the Lord did not want everyone to look or think exactly the same. To quote Morgan Freeman's character responding to a little girl's question, "Why did God paint you?" in the movie, *Robin Hood*, "Because (God) loves wondrous variety." The Almighty made you to be you, no one else, and wants you to simply be the beautiful and wonderful human you are created to be.

I think, too often, we try to be someone else. We want to act like them, but are we supposed to be actors? You weren't made to be like or act like anyone else. God made you to be you. Is that the person you desire to be? Or, do you still want to be who you want to be?

Let's go a little deeper into this. Those of us who are "in Christ" as Second Corinthians describes, we are a "new creation". This does not mean that we are someone totally new. "New", in this sense, means we have been reset to what God intended for us in the beginning; we are restored to the beautiful creation the Almighty made in us.

All the external stuff is washed away, think of the waters of Baptism, and we stand before the Lord, worthy through the grace of Jesus. There is no account of wrongs we did once upon a time; they are forgiven. And, the voice we hear in our head when we see the bathroom scale, that criticism isn't allowed in the presence of God Almighty. No criticism is allowed because there is nothing to criticize. At that moment, we are precisely who the Lord created us to be, and we are beautifully and wonderfully made.

Of course, this perspective does bring with it certain consequences. When God let's us see who we really are, that is the best version of us, and we want to be that person more and more. Therefore, the changes we make are not us acting like someone else; we are simply being more like the person God sees in us, which is who we really are.

You're probably wondering, "How do I get this vision of who God sees in me?" Well, it takes discipline. Just like the discipline it takes to go to the gym and watch what you eat if you want to lose weight, if you want to see who God sees in you, it takes commitment, but I promise it's less work than you'd put in at the gym.

There are things I suggest you do: 1) limit the voices that criticize you; they muffle the voice of God's incredible love for you, 2) pick up the Bible, particularly the words of Jesus. See how our Savior loves and forgives and restores individuals, and 3) spend time in prayer. Ask the Lord to reveal to you . . . yourself! Then, pray for grace to be . . . yourself! Grace is both forgiveness for not being perfect and strength to be better moving forward.

Happy New Year! May God bless us all by restoring us to who we really are!

There's a cartoon (by the Surreal McCoy) that gets around social media this time each year - it's a pencil drawing of diners sitting outside a restaurant and exclaiming, "These eggs are astonishing!" and "It's a caffeine miracle!" and "Now I understand hash browns!" The title is "Breakfast at Epiphany's."

Epiphany, often referred to as a moment of revelation or insight, comes from The Greek words for *appearance* and *manifestation*, and throughout the season of Epiphany we'll be reminded that the True Light that enlightens all nations has come into the world: (John 1:9) God made manifest through Jesus in the most beautiful mystery of the incarnation.

From the visit of the Magi, to Jesus's baptism by John the Baptist in the Jordan, to his first miracle at the wedding feast in Cana, to the revelation of God's glory transfigured on the mountainside, we'll see "the light that shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5) made manifest for all as God's extravagant and irrational love is born into the world to change it forever.

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Between the seasons of Epiphany and Lent we'll hear many stories of Jesus healing people in body and spirit, patiently training his disciples, teaching small and large crowds who are hungry for the Word, and then sending his disciples out to proclaim God's mercy, grace, and love. Later Jeus will say "Go and tell" to the healed and the disciples, as the one who shows himself to us bids us to make his mission known among all nations.

Epiphany is a time of joy and celebration because...the story is out! Jesus, the Light of the World has been born to dispel the darkness that covers its people. God's glory appears in human form. Life on earth will never be the same again!

As beloved children of God and followers of the Way of Jesus we carry that light of God's love within us. With God's grace, may what we do and say shine forth that light in our lives and into the world this new year. Let it shine, let it shine, let it shine!

Thomas Merton offers this on Epiphany,

We who have seen the light of Christ are obliged, by the greatness of the grace that has been given us, to make known the presence of the Savior to the ends of the earth...not only by preaching the glad tidings of his coming: but above all by revealing him in our lives...

Every day of our mortal lives must be his manifestation, his divine epiphany, in the world which he has created and redeemed.

And the poet Mary Oliver sums it up: Pay Attention. Be astonished. Tell about it.



Providence Books Through Bars 2024 Summary and Year-End Appeal



As many of you know, we moved to our "new" location at St. Barnabas Church in Warwick in 2022. It's a comfortable space and at least a few people show up every week to answer letters and pack books - we didn't miss a single Sunday all of 2024!

Our fundraising efforts included an October yard sale at Tara's house (our most successful ever). We appreciate the donations and our loyal customers; it's become quite an event!

Thanks to <u>Paper Nautilus</u> bookstore which generously receives the hundreds of requests we receive monthly from inmates. Other local bookstores including <u>Books on the Square</u>, <u>Twenty Stories</u>, <u>Symposium Books</u> and <u>Mary's Paperbacks</u> have also supported us. Almost all of our books are donated, but volunteer Bob has been known to scour E-bay for deals on choice paperbacks, and Brown University's Library Community Engagement gave us a generous sum to purchase high-demand books that we never seem to have enough of.

We were the beneficiaries of several book drives, thanks to the Imperial Court of Rhode Island at Providence charity, Bay View Academy, and Bring Joy by Reading (a nonprofit led by two local high school students). Of course, we received many ad-hoc book donations from individuals, including St. Barnabas parishioners, throughout the year. (We are always open to donations of gently used paperbacks – please check out our guidelines). Thanks to all the individuals, organizations and businesses who donated money, books, goods, goodwill and time in 2024!

Your support makes a big difference as it directly benefits incarcerated people. Whether it's a request for a dictionary or a thriller, classic, self-help, history, fantasy, graphic novel or how-to book, the heartfelt letters we receive express a desire for learning, self-improvement, mental escape and connection. It's through our generous donors and volunteers that we can answer these requests and provide incarcerated people with free reading material and a link to someone on the "outside" who cares. Please check out our <u>provbtb.org</u> where we have posted some inmate <u>correspondence and art</u>. These pieces are great reminders of why we do what we do.

As many of you know, by far our largest expense is postage. Most of our outgoing packages contain several paperbacks and weigh in the 2-3 lb. range. The cost to send such a package is \$6.13 and we will mail roughly 1,750 packages in 2024.
